Welcome to the REACH Georgia team, business and community leaders! REACH (Realizing Educational Achievement Can Happen) is a 5-year mentoring and scholarship program where selected students can access up to \$10,000 in state financial aid at an eligible college or university in the state of Georgia. Each fall, scholar selection committees at participating school districts in the state of Georgia engage in the process of selecting new 8th grade students for this educational opportunity. The following grading rubric can help guide your district's decision-making process as you interview each student candidate.

To be considered for REACH Georgia program participation, each student applicant must:

- Be a U.S. Citizen or <u>Eligible Non-Citizen</u> (*Eligible Non-Citizens must provide proof of status to REACH Coordinator*)
- Be enrolled as a full-time student at an Eligible Middle School in the state of Georgia
- If selected, officially sign a Scholarship commitment in the Fall term of their 8th grade year
- Demonstrate and prove their household's <u>financial need</u>
- Have the potential to graduate high school with a 2.5 or greater HOPE-calculated GPA
- Not be truant and have good attendance
- Have a behavior record that reflects no more than 2 in-school suspensions during the 2 semesters or 4 quarters preceding the Spring term of their 7th grade year, and must not have any criminal or drug-related convictions

Note: Initial eligibility is addressed in the first 4 numbered pages of the REACH Student Application and must be confirmed by the school district REACH Coordinator *before* the student candidate is interviewed by the REACH selection committee.

REACH Scholar Interview Questions

The following is a list of sample questions for the student interview process. Please feel free to add questions or offer alternatives to determine if the student is a good fit for the program and has the potential to succeed at the postsecondary level.

- 1. Tell us some general information about yourself, such as some things that interest you outside of school.
- 2. Are you involved in any activities, clubs, or sports within your school or in your community?
- *3. Which subjects interest you in school now, and why?*
- 4. Describe a personal achievement or something you've done that you are proud of.
- 5. Describe a time that you overcame something difficult and what you learned from it.
- 6. What are some things that you would like to get better at while in high school?
- 7. Tell us about a school project or assignment that you were involved in that was successful.
- 8. Are you interested in going to college? If so, which colleges or universities have you considered applying for?
- 9. What sort of academic topics and/or paths of study might interest you when enrolled at college?
- 10. What sort of jobs do you expect to apply for once you've graduated?
- 11. How would your friends and teachers describe you?
- 12. How much would this program's mentoring and academic coaching elements benefit your family and your future?
- 13. Tell us about a leader/mentor in your family, school, or community someone you look up to.
- 14. How would you prepare to meet rigorous program requirements (discipline, attendance, and academic) in high school?
- 15. What are some examples of how you might be able to give back to your community after receiving this opportunity?
